

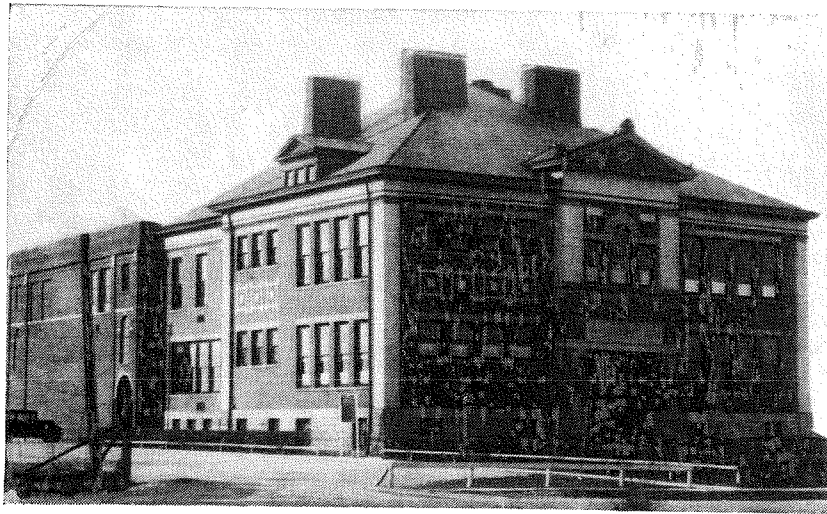

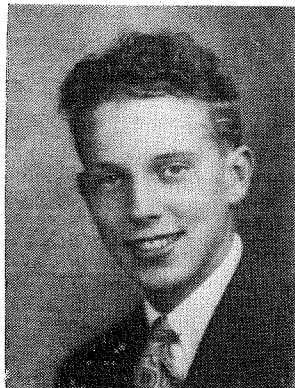
I, Harry Lease, do bequeath my ability to go with the same one to Joe Bell; and my typewriter to Junior Bruce so he might be able to take typing next year.

Prophecy of "46"

In the year of 1960 when the census was taken, I ran across some old school-mates. I asked why she was in the circus and they told me it was because the Navy was still not releasing the right sailor and she had to spend her time some way.

Next came the aerial act. I looked up and saw a little girl dressed in bright red tights. She looked very lovely up in the air. She was introduced as "Sailing Sue." As she swung closer there seemed to be something

By that time the circus was over, so we went outside to see the side shows. Something seemed familiar about that black hair and those bangs. I could hardly believe it was Jean Siddall but when I inquired they said I was right. It seems she at last found a way to gain weight, but no way to stop gaining. Since she was making so much money, she wasn't sure she wanted to.

That was about as much as I could stand, so I decided to take the first train, plane or bus away from such things as had appeared before me in this mad evening.

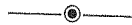

Mona Jo Fastoff was here for part of the year and then left us to go to New York. The important event of this year was our initiation which made us fulfilled "Freshies." Miss Hall was our Sponsor.

In our Sophomore year Richard Lamper was again elected President with Charlotte Hoover as Vice-President and Bud Lease served as Secretary-Treasurer. Eull Wallace and Patricia Henry were on the Student Council. Frank Dively and Imojean Gano dropped out and Rowena Sterner and Eugene Ingram moved in to fill their places. Judy Bowyer was our Sponsor.

In our Junior year, Richard Lamper still succeeded in getting our votes for President with Eull Wallace as Vice-President and Margaret Ann Elkins was Secretary-Treasurer. Jean Siddall and Bud Lease were Student Council members. Eugene Ingram dropped out to join the Navy and Bill Webb joined us. Our play, "The Campbells Are Coming" was a great success. The Junior and Senior Reception was held at the Izaak Walton league. Mrs. Kistler and Ondah Pickens were our Sponsors.

On September 3, 1945, eleven members enrolled in the Senior class. Bill Webb was elected President with Jean Siddall as Vice-President and Charlotte Hoover served as Secretary-Treasurer. This year the Student Council was abolished because of NO CONSTITUTION. The reception, which the Juniors gave in our honor, was held at the Izaak Walton league. This we all enjoyed very much. As for the Senior class play, "A Pair of Country Kids," directed by Hildreth Hall, it turned out to be very good.

With all our hard work and struggling, we finally succeeded in turning out the Spotlight of "46." Since we had so much money left over from the play and the
