

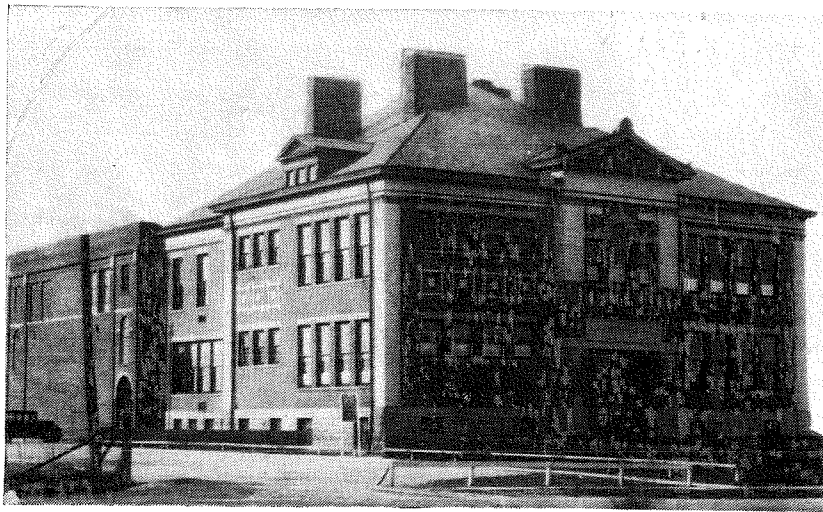

We, the Seniors of "47" about to start on the Journey of Life, realize that our happiest days have been spent here at good old L. H. S.

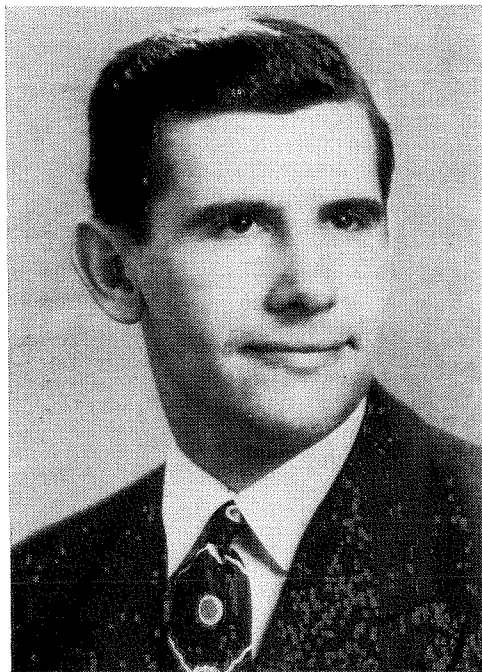

While sitting in my seat one day, I heard a Junior named Kenny say: "Up". What we want to know is: What does it mean?

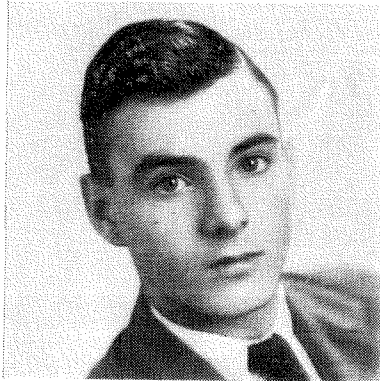
Another remark that was dropped near me was: "How's it." We'll ask Kenny again.

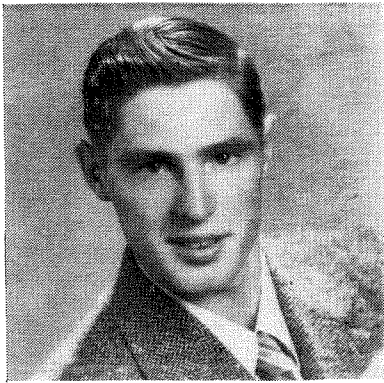

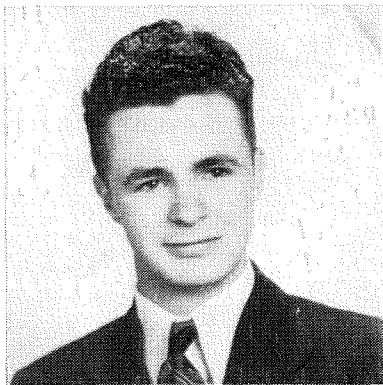

Class History
